Range Opening Procedures

At the front gate, STOP, unlock the gate and lower the sign to let everyone entering know that there is a range in use. You do not need to re-lock the gate once you are in the parking lot.

Park your vehicle and go sign into the log book located in the grey lock box to the left of the back door of the club house. You must sign in with your name, membership number, the time of arrival, and which range you will be using.

You may only bring one guest per membership at a time. Each guest you bring my only come with you once to shoot. The allowance of guests is meant as a means to allow non-members to experience the facility. If they like it and wish to continue using it, they can join. Guests must be entered into the log book as well. Their name and contact number must be clearly printed and they must sign beside it.

While you are there, grab a first aid kit and a red arm band from the plastic container on the ground under the lock box. Take these with you to the range you will be using. You MUST have these with you at the firing line.

When you get to the range you will be using, lower the sign to let everyone know that you are using that particular range and drop off the first aid kit. The red arm band should be on your arm.

Now it's time to set up your targets. Targets must NOT be set up more than 1 metre (3 feet) forward of the backstop. If you want to shoot a shorter distance, you can move the firing line forward to reduce the distance. Do not set targets directly on the railway tie at the base of the burm. No glass targets are to be used.

You can now retrieve your firearm and ammunition from your vehicle. You MUST uncase your firearm at the designated safe area. NO AMMUNITION IS ALLOWED AT ANY SAFE AREA. Your ammunition must be left on one of the tables or benches. Once your firearm is uncased, you may place it on one of the tables, benches, gun racks, or in your holster.

Eye and ear protection are mandatory for everyone on an active range.

When you are done shooting, you MUST pick up all of your spent casings. If you do not wish to take them with you, you can deposit them in the box attached to the center post of the canopy on the 100 yd range.

You must re-case your firearm at one of the designated safe areas. Again, NO AMMUNITION IS ALLOWED AT ANY SAFE AREA.

All garbage (targets and/or ammunition boxes, ect) must be cleaned up before you leave the range. All paper, cardboard (including coffee cups) and wood is to be taken to the incinerator. The incinerator is located beside the large oak tree behind the 25yd portion of the 25/50 yd range. Plastic and other non burnable waste is to be put into one of the provided garbage bins or taken with you.

When you are finished cleaning up the range you have been using, raise the sign to indicate to others that the range is no longer in use and return the first aid kit and red arm band to the box at the club house and enter your departure time in the log book. If other people are still using the range you are on when you leave, pass the red arm band and first aid kit to another member and leave the sign down to indicate that someone is still using that range.

When you leave the property, be sure to raise the large sign to let everyone know that none of the ranges are in use and re-lock the gate. If other people are still shooting, do not raise the sign or lock the gate.
